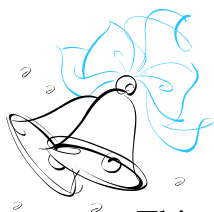

As befits the start of a New Year when we “ring out the old & ring in the new” thoughts turn to our Church bells. Each year we support the above charity . During 2013 we made a payment of £50.00

This organisation was founded January 5th 1924 (Charity No.258271) with the aim to be of service to the church in the diocese of Peterborough by:-

- a) ringing for divine service
- b) recruiting and training of ringers
- c) encouraging the list of change ringing
- d) helping ringers to improve their standard of ringing
- e) care and restoration of bells and their fittings.

We also have our own separate Bell/ Carillon Fund to cover expenses such as new ropes, new stays, cleaning ,oiling or repairs etc. Since 2010 an amount of £800 has been spent on Aynho bells with a large amount of gifts and labour coming from the ringers who perform in our Tower.

This is also an opportunity to welcome any new potential bell ringers into our chamber. Good company, good exercise, why not give it a go?

FROM your BIODIVERSITY GROUP

The world's largest wildlife survey fun, the Big Garden Birdwatch, takes place on 25th January, helps garden wildlife and couldn't be easier! Starting life as something for young people to take part in, the Big Garden Birdwatch has grown into fun for all the family. All you need to do is count the birds in your garden, the play area or sports field, for one hour over the weekend of 25-26 January 2014 then tell the RSPB what you see. It couldn't be easier! Almost 590,000 people took part last year.

1. Record the highest number of each bird species you see at the same time. Don't count the total over the hour as you may get the same birds visiting more than once. Also, please only count those birds that land within your garden - not flying over.

2. Once your hour is up, tell the RSPB what you've seen. Even if you didn't get as many birds as you expected, or your 'regulars' didn't appear, do still please let them know. It's all really useful information.

Bird of the Month.....Wood Pigeon

The wood pigeon is the UK's largest and commonest pigeon. It is largely grey with a pinkish breast and a green, purple and white neck patch. Juveniles are browner, duller and lack the white neck patch and so are sometimes confused with the smaller stock dove. Nesting begins in early spring. Both parents build the nest which is a rather loosely put together collection of twigs in a tree, bush, building or even on the ground. They lay just 2 eggs but can have as many as 3 clutches over the breeding season. Incubation is shared by both parents and both feed the young from regurgitated food that is sometimes called "pigeon milk". The chicks leave the nest at around 25 days but are only fully fledged at 35 days. In the meantime they perch close to the nest and continue to be fed by the parent birds. Wood pigeons eat crops like cabbages, sprouts, peas and grain as well as buds, shoots, seeds, nuts and berries. They drink a lot, mainly because they do not get sufficient moisture from their food. They use their beak like a straw sucking up the water unlike other birds that scoop it up. Many farmers consider wood pigeons to be pests due to their habit of raiding crops and feeding on the abundant food in large flocks. The majority of young birds are likely to die within their first 12 months, but the record age for a ringed wild bird is over 16.



Did You Know?

- It is one of the few birds that thrive in intensively farmed countryside, while it is also equally at home in town parks and suburban gardens.
- Oilseed rape is a favourite winter food, and partly explains why these birds are thriving in the modern countryside.
- 'Pigeon milk' is more nutritious than human or cow's milk.
- The capacity of the bird's crop is remarkable: it can hold as many as 150 acorns, 1,000 grains of wheat or 200 beans all of which are digested overnight.
- Although wood pigeon is the most commonly used name, this bird is also known as the woody, cushat, cushy-do, quist, ringdow and ring dove.

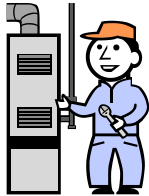

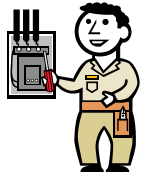

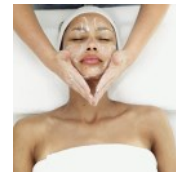
