From your Rector.

It is a well known phrase that actions speak louder than words and that a picture speaks a thousand words. Easter is a time when both of these adages ring very true.

Jesus had spent the last three years of his life telling those who would listen about God's love for them and his creation. Jesus had told his closest friends, his disciples, what the future held for him, how Jesus would be arrested and beaten and killed and raised to life on the third day. He knew they had heard his words but hadn't understood the implications. So before he is arrested he gathers his friends together for a special meal. A meal that for generations had celebrated freedom and hope. Now Jesus shares it with his friends giving it a new meaning for them. One they would treasure and cherish and hand on from one generation to another, even to today and beyond. In the actions of that meal, in the taking, breaking and giving of bread and in sharing a common cup, Jesus' actions spoke louder than the words he had used before. His actions we still echo today each Sunday as we gather to remember and give thanks. His last great action of hope was in his death and resurrection, which we celebrate on Good Friday and Easter Sunday. This is a celebration that is not tied neatly into modern life, at the same time each year, but one that relates to the rhythm and continuous cycle of the earth, God's creation. As such it keeps catching us out, it is something that we do not have control over, yet has control over us.

Jesus' journey to the cross is often depicted in pictures known as the Stations of the Cross. Here pictures attempt to capture the significant moments of that journey and when we view these pictures today, we can imagine ourselves as part of them. This Easter I invite you to come on a journey and see and I don't think you will regret coming.

Palm Sunday 29th March



On Palm Sunday we remember the day that Jesus entered into Jerusalem riding on a donkey and was greeted by welcoming crowds who waved palm branches like banners in their joy. This year Palm Sunday falls on a Benefice Sunday when all our five village churches meet together to worship. As this is a special Sunday we will be meeting for **10am at All Saints School, Croughton** to start our service with the blessing of the Palm Crosses and then process to church, re-enacting in a small way Jesus' entry into

Jerusalem. At church we will listen to a dramatised telling of his passion, the last week of his earthly life before his death. The communion service will be followed with refreshments. Parking available on the main road near the school.

Holy Week 30th March—4th April

Holy Week is the week between Palm Sunday and Easter and is the most holy week of the Christian year. Each day there are special services in each of our five churches as we relive Jesus' final week. This has always been a time when Christians made extra efforts to attend church.

Compline Services

The Compline Service is a short service of Night Prayer or Prayers at the End of the Day. It's the final short said church service of the day. The English word *Compline* is derived from the Latin *completorium*, as Compline is the completion of the working day. (See Service Sheet)

Maundy Thursday 2nd April 7pm Maundy Communion Meal.

This is the day that Jesus shared his last supper with his disciples and when he was then betrayed and arrested. This year we will remember and re-enact that last meal in an extended Eucharist or Maundy meal. This will take place in Aynho Village Hall from 7pm and combines a simple 3 course meal with a Communion or Eucharist following Jesus' command to "do this in remembrance of him". There will be no charge for the meal, but for catering numbers I ask that you sign up on the lists in church. or email me the.revd.simon@gmail.com to sign up for the Maundy Thursday Communion Meal.

Good Friday 3rd April

Is the day that Jesus died on the cross. It is only 'good' because Jesus' death was followed by his resurrection and proof of his power over sin and death. We celebrate Good Friday at 11am in the morning with an All Age Praise Services at Evenley Village Hall and a Good Friday service at 11am Aynho followed by hot cross buns.

In the afternoon we have

2pm 'An hour at the cross' at Hinton-in-the-Hedges as we remember the last hour that Jesus suffered before his death. This is a reflective service with music and readings for adults supported by the Benefice Festival Chorus.

The churches at **Aynho**, Evenley, Farthinghoe will be open 12 noon to 3pm for quiet private prayer and reflection. Hinton church will be open 12 noon to 2pm

From your Parish Council

Defibrillator

The Parish Council is pleased to announce that due to the hard work and fundraising of Amanda Limb in her Winter Lunch Club supported by other donations we have enough funds to purchase and support a defibrillator for the village. The unit will be sited on the outside wall of the village hall. This is a significant resource available to everyone in the village and has been proven to be a life saver when cardiac events occur and the patient is waiting for ambulance to arrive. We will be having an initial familiarisation session at the Annual Village Meeting on 27th April so please come along and hear how the unit should be used.

The Village Green and Parking

In last years village survey the poor state of the Village Green was commented upon by residents as cars tend to park on the verge. The Parish Council are proposing that posts around the Village Green edge are re-instated (although not with chains linking the posts as before). It is appreciated that this will reduce the space to park by 2/3 spaces.

To compensate for this the Parish Council have approached The Parochial Church Council about the possibility of a small number of dedicated car parking spaces being made available to residents who live on or near Roundtown. The proposal is that residents could apply for the use of a space, which would be specially reserved for their own use. In return it is proposed that the resident would pay a small donation, as yet to be agreed but estimated at £15 a month, to the PCC for the use of the dedicated space. If you would like to apply in principle for use of one of the spaces, which would initially be on a years trial basis, or have any comments, could you please contact email Sadie (sadie.patamia@aynho.org) or on 07887548774.

Gigaclear

Gigaclear have announced that they intend to start the installation works for Ultrafast broadband in April. As mentioned before this will require the digging of shallow utility trenches in all roads and streets throughout the village. Once we are given details of the proposed plans and the schedule of works these will be published on the Village website and in the newsletter. All properties within the village, even if you have not signed to use the service, will be provided with a 'pot' at the boundary from which broadband connection can be made to the home. This works are expected to last about 2-3 months and will cause some disruption. Representatives of Gigaclear are expected to attend the Village Meeting on 27 April to provide an update on the plans. Bio diversity - Plant of the Month: The Bluebell

The bluebell is common throughout England and Ireland, but is now rare in the rest of Europe and completely absent in the rest of the world. It is a member of the lily family. Its shoots emerge in January, it flowers in April and May and by June it has disappeared for another year. Because it does most of its growing and flowering early in the year, before the leaves on the trees open, it has plenty of light and so is able to replenish nutrients stored in its bulb. Its pollen and nectar rich flowers are also an important early food source for bumblebees, hover flies and butterflies. Our native bluebell, however, is under threat from the more aggressive Spanish variety which was introduced to English gardens nearly 300 years ago. This is easier to grow, less choosy about its habitat and can rapidly meld with its host and change its biological make-up. Increasingly it is spreading from gardens into the wild and into the preferred habitat of the English bluebell – the woodland areas. The English bluebell is much slower growing than its relative taking 5 years from the seed stage to flower and even then is in no hurry to spread. One study discovered the flower extends its range by only 50m in 35 years. Because of this slow spread they are considered an indicator of an ancient woodland site (one that has been in existence since before 1600 and may link back to the wildwood that grew across Britain after the last Ice Age) whether there are trees still there or not. This April and May look out for the bluebells we planted under the trees by the Sports Field main entrance and visit one of our local 'bluebell woods'!

English Bluebell

- Narrow leaves 1cm
- Deep blue (sometimes white narrow, tube like flowers with tips turned back
- Flowers mostly on one side of stem and drooping.
- Distinct sweetish scent.
- Cream pollen.

Know your Bluebell

Spanish/hydrid BluebellBroad leaves - 3cm

- Paler blue/white or pink conical or bell shaped flowers with tips spread
- Flowers all round a straight stem.
- Almost no scent.
- Blue pollen.



Did You Know?

- The bluebell is a symbol of constancy and is probably the origin of the '.... something blue' that a bride should wear on her wedding day.
- Folk myth has it that bluebells ring to call fairies to meetings.
- Bluebell glue was used to attach feathers to arrows in the Bronze Age and by bookbinders in the Middle Ages.
- It is estimated that the UK has half the world's population in wild bluebells.
- Bluebell plants are poisonous. The chemical that makes them poisonous was used in alchemy and is being researched by modern day scientists for medical use.
- It is illegal to uproot any wild plant without the landowner/occupier's permission and since 1998 it has been illegal to uproot or pick for sale wild bluebells.
