Rectors Ramblings

Easter Day may be over but for the Christian church the celebration of Easter and new life runs for 6 weeks until 25th May when we remember Jesus' ascension, or the day that he went back to heaven. The Christian year can be hard to follow with some events played out in real time, i.e. the 40 days Jesus was seen after his resurrection. To the 30 years of his life covered in the three months from Christmas to Easter. But 10 days after Ascension day 25th May we will celebrate Pentecost or the coming of The Holy Spirit to Jesus' disciples, which enabled them to go and share the good news of Jesus with others.

Jesus told his followers "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses ...to the ends of the earth. When he had said this...he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight...Then they returned to Jerusalem ... and were constantly devoting themselves to prayer...

When the day of Pentecost had come they were all together in one place... All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit... and that day about three thousand persons were added." Acts 1,2

For many years many us of will have prayed the Lord 's Prayer and be familiar with the phrase '**thy kingdom come**, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven'. The prayer for 'thy kingdom come' has been on the lips of Christians for some 2000 years. Last year the Archbishops of Canterbury and York started an invitation for Christians to use the 10 days between Ascension and Pentecost to join him in prayer for God's kingdom to come. This call to prayer has become an international and ecumenical call to movement uniting people from all over the world.

Between 25th May and 4th June, communities and churches around the world are gathering together to pray that their friends, families and neighbours come to know Jesus Christ. Prayer events of all shapes and sizes will take place across the 10 days, including 24-7 prayer rooms, prayer days, prayer walks and half nights of prayer. Cathedrals, churches and other venues will host Beacon Events, gathering people across towns and cities to worship and to pray for the empowering of the Holy Spirit for effective witness In our Local communities our churches will be open for quiet and prayer during the day and will host special candle lit quiet times in the evenings.

This will start with an Ascension Day service at 7pm on 25th May at Aynho

Followed by churches open in the evening 7pm-8pm for people to come and go as they please, to pray, to reflect or just to enjoy the peace and beauty of the church

From your Parish Council Village Parking & Use of St Michael's Church Car Park

Background

The 2014 'Village Survey' highlighted the community's concern regarding the lack of parking, especially in the older parts of the village. Comments highlighted various frustrations of residents, especially those relying on street parking who are sometimes unable to park adjacent to their homes. The issue has been further complicated that in the same Survey residents also expressed the view that the Parish Council (PC) must act to reduce parking on verges and the Village Green.

In Summer 2016 a survey was carried out of villagers most effected and there was a 47% response. It was established that many households in the affected areas experience difficulties parking at some time, with some households affected once or twice each week. At the time of the survey the PC conducted a count of cars regularly parked in the village and the number of spaces available. In summary, there appears to be circa 110-120 cars regularly parked within the village by residents with 'optimum' on-street parking for 105 cars. Which suggests, the village has 'just about' adequate parking but with little capacity for visitors. As such, a solution which identified an extra 15-20 spaces is required.

Way Forward

The PC has been told by NCC Highways that there is no funding available and as such any solution would have to be self-funded. The costs of providing dedicated additional parking spaces are well in excess of the PC resources within the current precept level.

The PC has consulted with Aynhoe Park, The Cartwright Hotel, The Village Hall Committee, Aynho Court Residents Association and St Michael's Parochial Church Council (PCC) to examine both procedural solutions and also to find additional space.

The key development is that the PCC have kindly agreed that from 1 May residents may use the church car park overnight where roadside parking isn't otherwise available. In principle residents may use the Car Park from 1700 to 1000 hours the following morning. The PCC will establish a notice board in the Car Park which will advise when parking is not available due to the Church's own requirements to use the Car Park – in reality this will be infrequent.

Initially the village's use will be on a trial basis and may be withdrawn if abused. By using the car park residents will be deemed to have agreed to specific terms of use as detailed separately. If the trial proves successful the PCC will look to improve the lighting. The PC will make an annual contribution to the PCC for village residents' use of the Car Park.

The Parish Council is currently drafting a guide to parking in Aynho, including details of locations and 'best practice' guidance. This will be published on the village web site – go to <u>www.aynho.org/parking</u> and will include the rules for using St Michael's Car Park.

Additionally The Cartwright & Aynhoe Park have agreed to work more closely to encourage visitors to Aynhoe Park weddings and staying at the Cartwright to use the Park's facilities rather than the hotel's parking and for their residents to be informed that parking is an issue and that they should be considerate with regard to where they park.

The Parish Council is introducing a voluntary residents' parking badge (shown above); the objective being to identify resident parking from visitors. And, where residents are happy to give contact details to the Parish Council, provide emergency contact in the event of access issues for emergency services.

Finally as a result of the provision of additional space the PC intend to formalise the parking restrictions on the Village Green and on the verges outside Aynho Court with the installation of bollards. In the latter case this is at the request of Aynho Court Residents Association and also as it is a safety issue.

Conclusion

The Parish Council hopes these measures collectively will go some way to resolving some of the frustrations residents experience with parking. Additional space will be available within the village – although not necessarily immediate adjacent to residents properties.

Obviously these will only work if everyone is involved and takes their share of responsibilities, such as respecting the conditions of use for the church car park, making better use of their own parking facilities and considerate parking on the roadside.

BIODIVERSITY GROUP - WARNING: IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN!

The Blandford Fly

Blandford flies are a species of black fly. They are approximately 2 - 3mm long making them only slightly larger than midges. The females lay their 200 – 300 eggs in the cracks of steep river banks in June and July. These eggs then lie dormant through the winter. In March having become moistened with the higher water levels



over the winter. In March having become molstened with the higher water levels over the winter, the larvae emerge. Clinging to the riverside plants by hooks on the end of their abdomens and a kind of silk they help to clear the water by filtering out small food particles brought to them by the current. Five weeks later they pupate and in May the adults emerge. They are now on the wing through May, June and July flying close to the ground and ranging approximately 1km from water. Males only feed on nectar but females need a blood meal before they can lay their eggs. Their scissor-like mouth parts cut the skin so they can inject an anaesthetic and suck the blood. In June or July, once her eggs have matured, the female returns to the river to lay them and the cycle begins all over again. Although the females bite domestic, farm and wild animals they do seem to prefer dogs and humans. Bites tend to be on the lower limbs and women seem to be bitten more than men but this may be because skirts leave the lower limbs uncovered.

Did You Know?

- The Blandford Fly got its name from a major outbreak of people being bitten around the town of Blandford Forum in Dorset in the 1960s and 1970s.
- The saliva from the fly often causes severe irritation, pain, swelling, blistering, a high temperature and joint pain with some people needing to seek medical advice.
- Streams and rivers can support vast numbers of blackfly larvae (perhaps 10,000 per square metre of river bed).
- Stuart Hine, entomologist at the Natural History Museum, said the growing popularity of water features over the past 10 years has encouraged the insects to migrate from the countryside to towns and cities.
