#### THE PARISH COUNCIL

#### **Maintenance Work**

The Parish Council organised its annual clean up at the end of March. There was a good turnout and the village and approach roads look much better. Our thanks to all those who took part. The annual safety check of the Children's Playground and the Sports Field was carried out by R.O.S.P.A. and the facilities declared safe. Monthly inspections are carried out by Councillors. Further new Neighbourhood Watch signs have been purchased for the village.

### The Village Plan

A review of the Plan, which runs from 2003 to 2008, indicated that in those aspects where the Parish Council had some influence, most things had been resolved. Items that were outside the Parish Council's control had been less successful. Work has already started on setting up a new Village Plan to cover the period from 2008 to 2013. Progress on the old Plan has been made in the following areas: -


- 1. Traffic Calming. We have again been largely frustrated in our attempts to achieve much here, despite a petition signed by over 460 people presented to Northamptonshire County Council in June. However there has recently been a development, as the County has been successful in a bid to obtain Government funding to assist with road problems, and we are expecting to share in this. Trained volunteers were able to participate in Speedwatch exercises again this year.
- **2. Parking** (or lack of it) is still a major problem being examined as part of the Village Development Project. Again we are faced with the problem of lack of funds to do anything. "No parking" signs have been placed on the two small greens.
- **3. Waste Recycling Scheme**. At last we have been included in this system, which seems to be working reasonably well so far.
- **4. Dog Fouling.** Due to the two dog bins this problem has decreased, although there are still one or two inconsiderate dog owners. There is a possibility that recent legislation could result in on-the-spot fines for not clearing up dog mess.
- 5. Communication About the Council. The village web site, <u>www.aynho.net</u>. is regularly updated with the Minutes of Parish Council meetings, a farming column, details of several country walks and news of other village societies and activities. Thanks are due to Lawrence Wilkinson for running the website.
- **6. Contacts with Local Farmers**. A fourth annual Farm Walk was held on the afternoon of 17<sup>th</sup> June 2007. Several local farms were visited and farmers were on hand to give talks and demonstrations and answer questions. At least 75 residents participated and enjoyed a tractor ride back to the Sports Field for a barbecue. The Farm Walk, again following a different route, will be repeated this year.
- 7. Footpath Maintenance. Gill Phillips has continued as Footpath Warden and regularly checks all the village footpaths. Local farmers continue to maintain the paths over their land and the Parish Council would like to thank them for their efforts. Details of five circular walks centred on the village are available on the website.
- **8. Sports Field Facilities**. Action has been taken to get the necessary repairs done to the pipework and septic tank at the sports field pavilion, to ensure that there should be no problems there in the future.
- **9. History Society**. A History Society under the Chairmanship of Brian Reynolds was established in June, and has been successful with at least 35 members.
- 10. Village Shop. At last there may be an opportunity to have a shop once more in Aynho. In July an informal group was set up consisting of Winifred Robinson, Stephen Brook, Colin Maklin, Amanda Limb and Peter Cole to look into the feasibility of renting part of the Cartwright Arms for a shop. A survey of villagers, with almost an 80% response rate, was followed by a Village Meeting in November. A presentation was made, showing that a shop could be viable, and a formal Steering

Group of Winifred, Stephen, Peter and Mark Krajewski was authorised to proceed with negotiations to try to secure a satisfactory outcome.

The Church fete was a happy, successful occasion held in the delightful grounds of Aynhoe Park House. Our grateful thanks once again to James Perkins. The fete this year will be held on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> June.

The Children's Society box collection raised £269.30, plus an additional £75 from a very enjoyable coffee morning. Our thanks to Deborah Gibbs and Sybil Stevens.

The Bell Ringers continue to practice in Aynho on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday of each month, other practices being shared between Croughton, Evenley and Kings Sutton. Our thanks to the team of ringers.



One of our greatest achievements this year was to hear the carillon operational once again after its much-needed overhaul. The total repair cost was over £6,000. A 'Spring Music Event' in aid of this project will take place in Church on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> May at 7.30pm. Following storm damage, repairs have been undertaken to the West window of the Church Tower.

Our team of Visitors continue to visit within the Village – if you would like a visit, do let me know. Our Bible Study and Prayer Group meet monthly, and details of our worship and activities throughout the Benefice are printed on the weekly Pew Leaflet (available from church or on the church notice board) and in the Village News Letter. 

# NORTHAMPTONSHIRE COUNTY COUNCILLOR REPORT Councillor Ron Sawbridge



I'm going to start by talking to you about the county council budget for the year which has just started. In our manifesto prepared for the election in 2005 we undertook to keep any increases in council tax in line with inflation. There was a proviso that this assumed we would be treated fairly by central government. Despite the fact that we have not been treated fairly over the last two years we have kept to our pledge in the budget for 2008/9. The council tax for this year shows the county council element increasing by 4.2% in line with the current rate of inflation measured by the RPI. For information, the county council part of you tax is 71% of the total, the police authority is 13%, the district council 12%, and the parish council 4%.

The county council receives income from three main sources, a direct ring fenced schools grant from central government only to be used for education, a formula grant also from central government, and finally the amount you pay in council tax. If the formula grant from the government does not increase by the same percentage as cost increases then the difference has to be made up from the tax you pay. The reason I don't consider that we are being fairly treated by central government is because they are not giving sufficient allowance for the fact that we have the fastest increase in population of any county, and yet we are to receive the lowest percentage increase of any county in the East Midland Region. Against this background we are also facing an increase in the numbers of the elderly and this presents a significant challenge for health and care services, including mental health services. Then there is the growing problem of how to cater for the large numbers of children and young people coming into the county from Eastern Europe who do not have English as their first language. This is placing a strain on our schools particularly in Northampton and Wellingborough. The government is now treating us financially as if this county is a unitary authority, an authority with only two levels of local government rather than the three we have now. This is reflected in the fact that our district councils have received an even lower increase in the money they receive from the government than the county council. This means that we urgently need to increase our partnership working not only with our district and borough colleagues but also with the private, voluntary, and community sector to find imaginative ways around the problems of service delivery against a problem of tight financial restraints.

In order to keep council tax increases at an acceptable level without drastically affecting service levels the council needs to become much more efficient. We have a new and excellent chief executive in Katherine Kerswell and an equally good new head of services for children and young people, Paul Burnett. The whole management structure is in the process of being revised cutting out a layer of management, a new more efficient and reliable I.T. system is to be introduced, and very importantly training is to be given to change the staff culture. Nobody is more aware than me of the poor level of communication in some certain parts of the council. Officers of the council need to start treating members of the public as customers rather than nuisances, because that's the impression that is often given!

So, back to the financial scene for this year, very much a 'no change situation' from the year which ended three weeks ago. We shall be spending: £72m on services for children and young people. This does not include money going straight to schools, part of this is the ring fenced grant from government but also a top-up from the council. £132m will be spent on community services including adult social care, a small increase on the past year. £92m on the environment, transport, highways, and protective services. In this connection you will have heard that the contract with Atkins for road maintenance is coming to an end and we have awarded the new contract to MGWSP (May Gurney Ltd). Hopefully they will work more efficiently and effectively than Atkins and improve the maintenance service on roads and footpaths. Having said this there is an awful lot of catching up to do and this will take quite a long time. It looks as if Brackley will at last have a new fire station and hopefully work will start on this in a few months time.

To finalise the budget part of my presentation, the amount to be raised through council tax is £219m equating to a council tax of £956.05 for a band 'd' property (last year £917.55).

As the county councillor for the Brackley West division I also chair the Children and Young People Scrutiny Committee. This includes the scrutiny of the services provided for education and all the children in the care of the county council. I am a member of the Corporate Parenting Board, a member of one of the two Adoption Panels, the county council's representative on SACRE (the Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education), and also the representative on the East Midlands Reserve Forces and Cadets Association, and finally vice-chair of governors at Magdalen College School.

Over the last few months I have been spending a great deal of time talking to schools about the problems they are facing in educating children who don't have English as their first language. Some schools have to cope with as many as fifty languages and this is placing a great deal of strain on their finances. The amount allowed by central government to cover the cost of what is called personalised learning is £601,000 a year but this is not sufficient to cater for children with special educational needs plus the immigrant children who need additional English lessons. The county top up the £601,000 to £900,000 but this is still not enough to adequately address a growing problem.

Turning now to the local scene, every one of the 73 county councillors has an annual sum of £10,000 at their disposal for minor schemes in their division. In the year just ended I have used up my full allowance on the following projects: Aynho: £350 contribution to the cost of updating the village plan, Croughton: £2,115 renovation of the war memorial, and £2,300 for two additional street lights and supports, Evenley £1,267 replacement of two very old street lights, Farthinghoe £1,937 payment for two additional street lights and supports, Brackley community association £1,032 contribution to one year's operating costs, Time2talk £1,000 contribution towards operating costs in Brackley.

The scheme is to continue for 2008/9 and I would very much like to include something of a substantial nature for this village.

Nobody is more aware than me of the problem of speeding traffic through Aynho and I am continually pressing the council for action to mitigate this problem. An action group has been formed to address this issue and I have joined this. Many villages have similar problems and the county have to prioritise and concentrate expenditure where it will have the most effect. Some villages have a much greater problem than Aynho particularly with the amount of traffic. I have raised this as I don't think we should expect a very expensive traffic calming scheme.

## SOUTH NORTHAMPTONSHIRE COUNCILLOR REPORT Councillor John Townsend



Many changes continue to affect Local Government. Looking back at previous reports I have made, some seem to have been issues for a number of years. One such has been the transfer of the ownership of the Council's 2,700 houses to a Housing Association. This is now happening as I write and, as of March 17<sup>th</sup>, the houses will be owned by a new Housing Association, South Northants Homes. Tenants should not experience too many immediate changes since most of the staff responsible for maintenance and management are being transferred to South Northants Homes. The management board of 15 will be divided between members of South Northants Council, Tenants and independently nominated members.

For myself, as Cabinet Member responsible for the Built Environment, I have spent a considerable time in discussions on the planning issues involved with the Governments proposed expansion of Northampton, Daventry and Towcester. One of the main issues has been that the new Local Development Framework, which is to replace the South Northants Local Plan, is to be a joint plan for Northampton Borough Council, Daventry District Council and South Northants Council. With all the emphasis on the growth of the towns it is important that the needs of the very large rural areas are not forgotten. I regularly emphasise that a village such as Aynho, nearly 30 miles from Northampton, has very little real affinity with Northampton.

However important future plans are for the District, Individual Planning applications can still generate heated debate. It is worth pointing out, as you will see from the Parish Council report, that most applications pass smoothly through the system. One application that did not was the application for a workshop and storage building at Aynho Park Corner. Without opening up the debate I followed the discussions at the Parish Council open meeting with great interest. With an issue like that a decision has to be made. Inevitably some are not going to agree but I think that the meeting was well handled by the parish Council and I certainly felt that I was aware of all points that were raised.

I note that I have reported on the old Burgess site in Brackley for the last 4 years. Happily work is now well advanced and hopefully should be substantially completed by the end of the year. I hope that the development with its mixture of shops and flats will make a real improvement to the Town Centre.

We always fear that the difficult growing conditions will mean depleted tables, but once again the hall was full of colour and fragrance. This year there was a new award, a Homecraft plate, for the competitor who had won the most prizes in the cookery and flower arranging categories.

We ended the year in November with our AGM, combined with an excellent talk on Jordan, given by Keith McClellan. This was followed by a buffet supper provided by the committee and members.

Events to look forward to this year include trips to gardens in Worcestershire in June and to RHS Wisley in October. Do come. We meet in the Village Hall on the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 pm from October until May.



#### **AYNHO HISTORY SOCIETY**

In 2007 Aynho History Society was formed at a meeting in Aynhoe Park. The initiative for this arose from the Village Survey 2002 and AHS now has thirty-five members. To date we have concentrated our activity on researching local, village history.

The projects have included research into the extensive network of tunnels that lie beneath the village; the ancient turnpike roads and stagecoach routes that passed through Aynho; the War Memorials and Aynho's first hospital. We also had a visit from a former soldier who was based in Aynhoe Park during WW2. In a discussion with some of the older residents, he was able to tell us many interesting things about Aynho's role in the storage and distribution of fuel.
